Introduction

Later, idols of Goddess Durga and her children are immersed in rivers or ponds (Visarjan) amid chants of 'Asche bochor abar hobe' (We will celebrate again next year). Families then exchange greetings called Bijoya Pronam, where elders bless the younger ones and sweets such as Sandesh, Naru, and Misti Doi are distributed.

Cultural Aspects

Vijaya Dashami in Bengal is as much a cultural event as it is religious. The five days of Durga Puja involve artistic pandals, traditional dhak (drum) sounds, dance, literature, and culinary heritage. The immersion processions combine devotion with vibrant cultural expressions.

Symbolism

Beyond rituals, Vijaya Dashami emphasizes values: courage, unity, truth, and the triumph of good. It marks both an end and a new beginning, reminding people to carry Durga's strength into their daily lives.
